Tales of a Legendary Postie

Guests and members at August's Tailem Bend Historian's General Meeting, were captivated by the tales of Allen "Burtie" Burt, the town's legendary postie with over 50 years of dedicated service under his belt. Tailem Bend Primary School, Friday, August 2, 2024.

Launching his postal journey in January 1974, Allen shared how he began as an Assistant Postal Officer or more humbly, a Telegram Boy, performing general duties in the Southern Division of the Postmaster General. **(PMG)**

One of his first roles involved working as the Telephone Night Boy, managing the Tailem Bend manual exchange. This was a fascinating experience for Allen, whose family had never owned a phone, marking his introduction to the marvels of modern communication.

Taking over from Harold Robinson, a World War II veteran, Allen embarked on his first mail run, which included a hefty 20 kilograms of mail on a push bike, taking four hours to complete. The volume of mail was staggering, with around a thousand letters daily during the Christmas period in the '70s and '80s. Today, the workload has shifted to parcels, with Allen delivering up to 170 parcels a day, in busy times.

Allen delivered mail for 24 years on his trusty push bike and recalled the changes over the decades. He noted how stamps, which were 10 cents in 1974, now cost \$1.50. The telephone exchange, manual until 1981, had five switchboards and fifteen staff before it went automatic. In 1998, the Post Office was sold to Maxine and Nigel Kiddie, with Allen being contracted to continue his regular duties with the new owners.

Beyond his regular mail deliveries, Allen was sometimes commandeered to help residents with a few odd tasks - from rolling a rusted tar drum for an old gentleman, changing a light globe for an elderly woman, pulling down blinds in the middle summer, to delivering groceries for someone who was housebound. Over the years, his postal deliveries have included everything from tractor radiators and ladders to rotary clotheslines and gaming chairs, and now, numerous boxes of wine. Regardless of the weather, mail in Tailem Bend is delivered five days a week to approximately 720 houses.

For Allen, the best part of being a postie is the deep connection with the community, knowing everyone and being a vital part of their lives. He is now delivering to the grandchildren and even the great-grandchildren of his original customers. He recounted a memorable incident where a lady, who always knitted on her front porch and waved to him daily, was frantically waving to him on one particular day. Busy and with no mail for her, "Burtie" sped past on his motorbike. The next day, she called him over and revealed that she had had a four-foot brown snake under her chair and needed his help!

The members of the Tailem Bend Historians were enthralled by "Burtie's" stories, providing a vivid snapshot of how much has changed at the local Post Office and, within the community over the years. This month we look at a member of the Roffey family and The Willochra Carriage.

Country Loss is Gain For City

Tailem Bend, The teenage drain from country to city will be felt especially in Tailem Bend with the departure of Desmond Roffey, 17, to join the Police force. He is the son of Mr and Mrs Roffey.

In the athletic field, Des is above average. When his father was stationed by the SA Railways at Peterborough, he attended the Peterborough Primary School, where he won the under-11 running championships and was awarded an athletic certificate. He captained the school cricket team and received an athletic certificate for cricket. Des played in the North-Eastern zone SA schools cricket carnival and the premiership team of the Peterborough International Rules Basketball Association.

No Trouble

As a long-distance swimmer, he had no trouble crossing the 440 yards of River Murray at Tailem Bend several times. Since his parents returned to Tailem Bend in 1963 his sporting performances have been outstanding. Des captained the Murray Bridge High School A-grade cricket team and opened their attack as a fast bowler. As an all-rounder he claimed many wickets and made numerous runs

Best Game

He played in the high school A grade football team either as a ruckman or centre half-forward. His best performance as a centre half- forward was against Oakbank Area School in 1967 when he kicked 10 goals and 2 points. In the Murray Towns Cricket Association at 13, he made his first appearance for the Tailem Bend A Grade team. In his first over Des bowled Mypolonga's captain and opening bat, Eric Burrett.

Selection

At the age of 15, he was selected to play for the Murray Towns Association against the Kensington Cricket Club. This team included one test and five Sheffield Shield players. In the 1966 – 67 season Des captained the Tailem Bend A grade cricket team. His tally of wickets for this team exceeds 100. Des began his football career with the Tailem Bend junior colt's team in 1961. He was promoted to senior colts in 1963 and was a member of the Tailem Bend undefeated senior colts in the River Murray Football League in 1964. He was selected in the River Murray in the Love-Lock Shield competition in 1965.

Trophy

He won the best player player's trophy in the SA State school boys' competition in 1966. In 1967 he captained the Tailem Bend senior colt's team and was selected to play in five A Grade games in the same season. Finding no suitable employment at Tailem Bend Des decided to make a career in the SA Police Force, which he joined. But sport is not being cast aside. In his spare time, Des is working for the day when he hopes he will be wearing the red and black colours of the West Adelaide Football Club.



New Life for Old Carriage

A place of the state's railway history, the former vice-regal railway carriage The Willochra, left the region last week. For the last nine years, the carriage has been among examples of railway memorabilia at Old Tailem Town.

Proprietor Mr Peter Squires has agreed to a request from the Port Dock Railway Museum, at Port Adelaide, to swap the carriage for a Red Hen railway carriage he said was told was built in about 1945. The Willochra, which Mr Squires claims is the oldest broad gauge carriage in South Australia, is near original but deteriorated condition. "It's been out in the weather and I didn't have time to either restore it or put it under cover," Mr Squires said.

"I decided to let the Port Dock Railway Museum have it because I consider it a State treasure."

The carriage replaced an older type carriage, Willochra, which was the show piece of the attraction, and one of the first pieces of memorabilia obtained for Old Tailem Town."Willochra' will now be on display at the Port Dock Museum, and Mr Squires said," we let go of our most prized possession in the interest of South Australian heritage."

According to Mr Squires the Port Dock Museum will restore the carriage and keep it under cover. Mr Squires said the Willochra was built as one of three mobile post offices that were used at towns along the Adelaide – Melbourne line, where people could post and collect their mail.

It was taken out of commission around 1895. By then Post Offices had been built at most towns, along or near the line. It was then reputedly turned into a vice – regal carriage, and made ready for the 1899 trip from Adelaide to Melbourne by Sir Edmund Barton, Australia's first Prime Minister (1901-1903), who was on his way to the east to draw up the Australian Constitution, prior to Federation in 1901. From there it was used as a vice- regal carriage until 1925, when it was involved in an accident and a new one was built. At the time. It was called The Murray – a name Mr Squires said was traditionally given to vice-regal carriages. When the vice-regal carriage was built, the old one was re- named The Willochra and continued to be used as the Railway Commissioner's carriage until 1966, when it was sold to Mr Nicholls, of Jabuk. According to Mr Squires, Mr Nicholls used it as a shearer's quarters, until Mr Squires bought it in 1982 and put it back on a set of bogies (wheel Assemblies) he (Mr Squires) bought from Australia National. Over the years, the old carriage was also used as an enquiry van at rail accident sites, and was also a mobile centre for what was then the Mothers and Babies Health Association, which used it as a centre for immunisation against polio. The Red Hen carriage, which Mr Squires said was in 'fairly good condition' was placed on a short length of track under the arch near to the entrance to Old Tailem Town.



"It gives us a real sense of coming together and allowing us to feel safe in showing our creative selves." Personally, I am not that creative, but Resin Art has been a true game changer for me – I can create a masterpiece just like the next person."

Reigan Hermann, an enthusiastic Centre volunteer, was thrilled to witness the impact of the workshop on the community. "It's amazing to see people come out of their shells and express themselves creatively through resin art," she said.

In August, Elected Members (EM's) acknowledged a local legend, **Lindy Northcott** (Tintinara) who celebrated 100 laps around the sun on the 4" August. What an amazing milestone, congratulations Lindy.

Mayor Simmons & Cr Pietzsch recently did an interview with Murray Valley Standard about **Country Health Connect** services at Coonalpyn and Tintinara. The CEO has written to Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network about EM's dissatisfaction with their response to our questions. **BIG THANKS** to community members who continue to work hard to ensure this matter continues to get attention so that our towns can maintain a decent level of health care.

The Council had about \$500K left over from the Australian Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program (phase 4) grant, and EM's agreed to spend it on Stage 2 of the Hutt Street Upgrade Project and Railway Terrace Northern Car Park Upgrade in Tailem Bend, sealing of the carpark at the Coonalpyn Swimming Pool precinct and upgrading the Tintinara Lions Park. These are "shovel ready" projects that can commence right away.

Other Capital Projects earmarked for this FY are **Stage 3 of Carcuma Road, Tintinara Town Hall kitchen and amenities** upgrade. Tenders have gone out for the upgrade to the Coonalpyn depot buildingand for spray sealing services (roads).

A review of the Policy is underway, and a draft was presented. EM's moved to adjourn this matter until more information and clarification is obtained on certain issues. There was much discussion about the Procurement Policy and appropriate weighting to providers who reside in our region. The Council acknowledges the vital role of local businesses in strengthening our district and will give appropriate weighting to businesses within our region wherever possible, where all other factors are equal.

The **Unbreakable Farmer** event was a great success with many people attending one of four locations. Peake (37+), Coonalpyn (90+), Meningie (53) and The Bend MSP (25+). Well done to all involved.

The Audit and Risk Committee reported that they are pleased that as of 30 June 2024, only 4% of Council employees had the equivalent of eight weeks or more of **annual leave entitlement** compared to 14% the year before. This has been a positive step by our CEO to get this area under control.

The popularity of the **Coonalpyn SM Caravan Park** continues to grow. In July last year there were 180 bookings compared to 243 bookings in July this year. | moved a motion to explore an additional 5 powered sites at the Park. This was supported and will be done in conjunction with exploring powered sites for the **Narrung Caravan Park**. The **Changing Places** toilet facility will go ahead at **Coonalpyn**. Draft drawings have been submitted along with a Development Application. The funding for this project is expected at the end of the year with construction to commence shortly afterwards. The **Salt Creek toilets** (which are in the hands of DIT) are meandering along slowly, despite weekly phone calls from Council staff chasing this up. DIT appear to still be committed to having this toilet built by Christmas 2024. Fingers crossed.

There has been some progress around **Wadmore House** Meningie) with the Minister advising that the encumbrance on the building can be changed to suit the community's needs, or it can be returned to the Minister. This conversation is still ongoing, and a briefing will be provided to EM's soon.

The **EV station at Tailem Bend** is now operational. Council have plans underway to beautify the area next to the station with sealing, picnic tables, cover and best of all, signage, which will highlight the businesses in the town. In March this year 28 community submissions were received with over 70% of people supporting EV stations and their locations. (read March 2024 Agenda on Council's website)

| questioned the full cost of NAIDOC week activities as | believe there are other ways to create meaningful engagement with the community. Council will hold a workshop around this topic and hopefully EM's can share their ideas about how to improve this event. A motion from Cr Pietzsch was passed, to explore urgently needed safety options for the high-risk intersection on Tynan Road/Kulkawurra Road, where they intersect with the Mallee Hwy.

Now, he eagerly anticipates our calls, which have become a lifeline, helping him reconnect with his loved ones.

September the 1st is known as National Wattle Day. The local Golden Wattle Acacia pycnantha is Australia's Floral Emblem, with uniforms of green and gold being worn by members of our Olympic team. When in Paris the team was referred to as a sea of green and gold.

Pangarinda Botanic Garden has also been a sea of green and gold from the many species of Acacia now blooming. Acacia pycnantha one of them. A fast-growing small tree to around 5 to 7 Metres. Living only 10 to 12 years, flowering at 2 to 3 years. Self-germination is common.

Acacia podalyriifolia is a tall spreading shrub, with silvery blue-green foliage. The soft hairy oval shaped leaves enhance the racemes of 10 to 20 bright yellow flowers blooming in mid-winter.

the scale of emotions can change quite quickly and other factors such as time weigh heavily on the situation.


Jesus is waiting as well. He is waiting for us.

Welcome to this month's Council update

Throughout July and August Coorong District Council has undertaken a range of activities, attended events and delivered programs across the district.

Around the District

The Community Facilities team have focused on tidying and trimming trees following strong wind events and maintaining community facilities across the district.

The 2024/25 Unsealed Roads Program has commenced, with 35km scheduled for re-sheeting across the district - Richardson Road, Culburra is the first underway. An additional 13km of Carcuma Road, Tintinara will also be upgraded to a sealed road standard, completing the sealing of the road within the Coorong District.

Rural road users are continuing to be supported through Council's **patrol grading program**, with over 300kms of unsealed roads graded in July - residents can expect to see graders in the Tintinara, Sherlock and Meningie areas in the coming weeks.

Weed spraying has been carried out on the **Tintinara Aerodrome** runway, and **footpath renewal** (new pavers) will shortly begin on

the corner of Princes Highway and Matson Street in front of the Meningie Post Office.

Key Decisions

At the 20 August Ordinary meeting, Council resolved to change Ordinary Council meeting start times to 3pm (from 5pm) commencing in September for a six-month trial period.

\$501,813 in funding from Local Roads & Infrastructure Program's Phase 4 were allocated towards several projects, further sealing of Hutt Street, Tailem Bend, upgrade of the Tailem Bend Railway Terrace northern car park to address stormwater issues, sealing of the Coonalpyn Swimming Pool car park and an upgrade of the Tintinara Lions Park.

The 2024/25 - 2033/34 Long Term Financial Plan was also adopted - this plan determines Council's financial sustainability in the medium to long term, while achieving the strategic outcomes set out in the Community Vision Plan 2021-2025.

Ordinary Council meetings will now commence at 3pm at the Coorong Civic Centre, Tailem Bend


BOOK REVIEW

The Sunken Road

A consummate masterpiece of structure and style, The Sunken Road belongs firmly in the bestselling tradition of Carol Shields's The Stone Diaries.

Anna's life is the theme as well as the content of this extraordinary novel. Taking the reader from her early years (or before her birth) to her old age, each chapter reworks this theme with a cumulative effect, constantly refining,



adding, illuminating and building on what has gone before, leaving the reader hanging on every word, desperate to glean the smallest new fragment of information about Anna. Her life has the flavour of a lover lost in Vietnam, a breakdown, a boring husband, an extramarital affair, a dead child, a lesbian daughter, and gothic relatives at every turn. But the way Disher presents this material transcends its simple content. From the events in Anna's life he derives piercing truths about the nature of regret, the impact of mortality and most importantly about the workings of memory and the nature of time.

The Tailem Bend community was treated to an inspiring afternoon on Sunday, August 11, 2024, as Warren Davies, known as The Unbreakable Farmer, shared his message of resilience and mental health awareness at The Bend's Shell V-Power Motorsport Park, Tailem Bend.

Thanks to a \$10,000 State Emergency Relief Fund grant secured by the Coorong District Council in partnership with the Suicide Prevention Network, Conversation Matters, the event brought together locals for an engaging and therapeutic experience. Commencing at the Peake Football Club on Wednesday, August 7 with a free community BBQ, then the Coonalpyn Football Club with a schnitzel night, on Thursday August 8, to the Meningie Golf Club with a schnitzel/steak night on Friday, August 9, Warren's Coorong leg of his speaking circuit, ended on Sunday, August 11, at Shell V-Power Motorsport Park, followed by a complimentary afternoon tea. Warren Davies, whose life journey has tested his resilience, persistence, and determination, spoke candidly about the challenges he has faced. From financial hardships to strained family relationships, Warren's life has been anything but easy. Yet, these very struggles have shaped him into The Unbreakable Farmer, a man whose story resonates with many, and whose strategies for managing mental health are both practical and relatable. Guests at the event were not only able to hear Warren's powerful story but were also invited to take part in a unique driving experience around The Bend's Shell V-Power Motorsport Park. This special opportunity was made possible through collaboration with Sarah Davis, co-founder and managing director of Drive Against Depression.

Sarah, who has worked closely with Warren, expressed her excitement about the event, noting the therapeutic benefits of driving. "There's something incredibly healing about the act of driving," Sarah said. "Whether it's the focus required or the conversations that naturally unfold on a road trip, driving can provide a muchneeded escape from the stresses of daily life. It's a moment beyond the walls of your mind, where you can reconnect with yourself and others," she said. The day's event highlighted how driving can serve as a form of therapy, particularly for those struggling with mental health issues. For many, the simple act of getting behind the wheel can be a way to break free from the emotional spiral that depression often brings. It's about reconnecting with the world, feeling the unique traits of your vehicle, and finding the headspace to seek further help.

The Bend's contribution to the event was significant, offering the track for guests to drive their own cars in support of Drive Against Depression. Participants donated \$20 each for the chance to experience the racetrack, with all proceeds going towards the

cause. As the afternoon drew to a close, Warren Davies reflected on the importance of community events such as this. "Mental health struggles can be crippling, but by coming together and sharing our experiences, we can find strength and support," he said. "I've seen firsthand how these conversations and connections can make a difference, and I'm grateful to be a part of it."

Through his work and the support of organizations like Drive Against Depression, and Anglicare SA's Standby Support after Suicide, Warren Davies continues to make a profound impact on the lives of thousands, reminding us all of the power of resilience and the importance of taking that first step—whether it's getting out of bed, or getting behind the wheel—to reclaim our mental well-being.
